CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The following policies are adopted to implement delivery of the curriculum in a well-planned manner and to maintain its proper documentation: 1. At the beginning of each academic session, the college prepares its proposed academic calendar, according to the notices and circulars received from the affiliating University, which is uploaded in the college website. 2. A master routine is prepared at the beginning of each Academic session and the same is circulated to different departments. Routine is prepared strictly in accordance with the number of credit points mentioned in the prescribed syllabus of each course offered by the departments. 3. Based on the departmental routine, departments conduct meetings for allotment of classes and syllabus distribution among the teachers. Students are given details of teaching assignment of each teacher at the beginning of a session by the department. A special time-table for online classes for all subjects is prepared and the same is notified to the students through the College website. 4. Based on the respective teaching assignments, teachers prepare their "teaching plans" according to the number of lectures allotted in the university syllabus for each topic. 5. Along with the traditional chalk and talk method, teachers also use electronic teaching aids effectively to enhance the quality of classroom teaching. Recently, during the pandemic, an extensive on-line teaching plan for all subjects, using digital platforms like Google Meet, Google classroom and Zoom etc. has been adopted to cater to the needs of the students. 6. The College maintains a regular, wellplanned, periodic assessment and evaluation system for the learners. Class tests/surprise tests and student seminars are held after completion of a section of the syllabus and periodic review of performance of students is undertaken. 7. Field tours and surveys are regularly organized by various Departments to fulfil the curricular requirements and to promote the interest of the learners. 8. Teachers are always ready to reach out to students if there is any need for counselling (academic or otherwise) even beyond the prescribed teaching hours.

The needs of the students in terms of knowledge and skills are assessed by the faculty members through reviewing the past academic and other relevant records of the students. At the very beginning of the course, the faculty members suggest each and every student about their future course of studies. If any student wants to change their combination of subjects and change of subjects, they are allowed. University of Calcutta provides Academic Calendar at the commencement of every session which consists of relevant information about tentative dates of course commencement, exam schedules. Other college activities like Sports Day, internal assessments, and all the co-curricular activities are prepared in accordance with University Calendar. The time table is designed for all the courses and is distributed amongst the faculty members of every department. The lesson plan is prepared in accordance with this timetable which in turn helps in the scheduling of classes. The faculty members maintain work diaries to record their individual work and they also create evaluation blueprints. In a few subjects, the question bank is created by the faculty members. Students are free to talk in any topic of their choice in different languages. B. Interactive sessions are conducted in the classroom amongst the students to nurture their critical thinking. Teachers involved the students to participate actively in the organization of all academic, curricular and co-curricular activities. Computers with internet facilities are available to all teachers and students, who are admitted. B. Wi-Fi and reprographic facility are used by the teachers as teaching aid. C. The library has subscription of INFLIBNET which allows faculties as well as students to get access to e-journals. Students are encouraged to take part in seminars and workshops. The teachers, apart from regular teaching, are always available for providing guidance to the students in addition to the class hours, as and when required. Students are always free to clarify their doubts. Tests and assignments are a regular part of the academic plan so as to keep a track of the students 'skills in terms of knowledge. On personal level, teachers provide guidance to students for higher studies, which Universities to apply and prospects for such studies in different subjects.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

For effective learning, continuous internal evaluation is a vital part of the teaching-learning process. As City College is an affiliated college under University of Calcutta, the scope of reforming in the Continuous Internal Evaluation system is curtailed and the college follows guidelines provided by the University. However, the institution undertakes certain definite steps or methods to initiate and regulate the Internal Reform process. The institution is continuously monitoring attendance of each student, their responses in class, periodically conducting class tests, analysis of each result and post result mentoring of students based on their identified areas of weakness. At the end of every course the faculty member undertakes doubt clearing classes for the betterment of the students. Apart from this, group projects and presentations which aim at fostering peer-learning and mentoring are also encouraged all throughout the year. Further debates, extempore, group discussion, or viva voce are also part of the continuous mode of assessment. Each department has worked out the details of how the Continuous Internal Evaluation is to be conducted for the courses, ensuring that learning objectives of each paper are achieved through different assignments which are designed such that they not only test the knowledge-base of the students but also prepare them for time management during examinations. The lockdown due to pandemic during the end of the academic session needed an evolved in Continuous Internal Evaluation System such as internal evaluation through email, Google form, viva voce, etc.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Academic calendar was prepared according to the guidelines issued by the University of Calcutta by the Academic Sub Committee. That Calendar is taken by all the departments as the base, and it is then duly modified by them incorporating all the departmental activities in it. For the CBCS system the academic year is divided into two semesters, each of duration of 15-18 weeks.

The University sends schedules of undergraduate examinations ahead of time. The Academic Sub Committee of the institution consults the calendar provided by the University before finalizing the college calendar.

The various suggestions for improvement for the upkeep of the computers and installation of software facilities (e.g KOHA) are given due cognizance for the smooth and efficient functioning of physical and e-learning resources as far as the library is concerned. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

1. Plastic has long been regarded as a toxic and extremely destructive material to our ecosystem, and its use should be limited, according to environmental scientists. Our college has planning to make the campus a "Plastic-free" zone and the college is taking substantial initiatives to ensure its proper implementation. 2. In addition, college is planning to declare the campus "smoke-free" and implement the same with strict regulation. Teachers, nonteaching staff, and students are all barred from smoking inside the college grounds. At all levels, serious attempts will be made to implement the same. 3. Because air conditioners (AC) are a major source of chlorofluorocarbon (CFC), a highly dangerous environmental pollutant, our college has taken steps to avoid using air conditioners as far as practicable. We have only 3 working air conditioners in our campus. Our main objective is to contribute in keeping our environment clean as much as possible and also to reduce electricity consumption in a significant way. 4. Providing pure and safe drinking water to all students, faculty, and other college-affiliated bodies is a top concern for

us, as is true for any other educational institution. Our college intends to take this matter seriously and will set up water purifiers and water coolers throughout the campus for students as well as in various departments. We will be able to deliver filtered drinking water to all stakeholders once the project is completed. 5. For the past few years, routine pest control on the campus has been practiced in partnership with Kolkata Municipal Corporation. This contributes to maintaining our campus pest free and preserving and protecting our infrastructure and precious assets in our central library and departmental seminar libraries from pest-related harm too.

7.2 - Best Practices

1. Several exceptionally intense and disastrous tropical cyclonic storms hit West Bengal in 2019-20, including Fani on 3rd May 2019 and Bulbul on 6th November 2019 causing considerable devastation in Eastern India, particularly along the coastal areas. During that time, some of our employees and students offered financial assistance, relief goods, and other forms of assistance to the impacted people, both directly and through students. Simultaneously, faculty members from all departments were familiar with the various techniques of online teaching in order to provide students with a hassle-free virtual classroom atmosphere. 2. During COVID-19-related lockdowns, students all across the world experienced mental tiredness and anxiety. With this in mind, in addition to conducting their classes online, faculty members regularly met with students on a one-to-one basis to solve their academic problems and provide the necessary counseling to allay their fears and anxieties caused by the uncertainty surrounding the pandemic and its adverse effects on themselves and their loved ones. 3. Various departments of the college planned virtual activities aimed at increasing student participation and involvement. These were held with the goal of presenting students with some crucial components of college life that would ordinarily take place on campus, such as freshers' orientation, cultural performances, and interaction with students from various departments, among other things. The students were enthusiastic about these activities, and they actively engaged, as well as expressing a wish to hold similar events in the future.

7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

City College, Calcutta is a name in intelligentsia to boast about the glory of the Bengal Renaissance, which enlightened the entire country, with 139 years of greatness. Tradition and modernity, legacy and technology, history and vision have helped to establish the college as a national educational institution, resulting in Indian diaspora all over the world. The City College arose from a seabed of extensive educational activity in Bengal by the magnanimous members of the Sadharan Brahmo Samaj in the late nineteenth century. Since then, the Brahmo Samaj Education Society (BSES), with its distinguished educational history, has been entrusted with playing a pivotal role in elevating the City College to its pinnacle as a learning institution. BSES came forward and started its journey by establishing a number of educational institutions for the marginalized middle class of Bengal during a period when only a few Government educational institutes were present. The goal came true when Anandamohan Bose, Bengals first Wrangler, founded City College as a high school

on January 6, 1879. The establishment of the school was made easier because of the unwavering support and help of Pandit Shivnath Shastri and Rastraguru Surendranath Bandyopadhyay. The school was founded with the goal of providing better and more complete education to Indian students of all castes and creeds. Gradually, the school improved to meet all of the universitys standards. The City school was expanded to include a first-grade college in 1881. The unassisted City College of Calcutta had a unique and distinguished position in reference to the reading of science, wrote Sir Alfred Croft (then Director of Public Institutions) in his official report. The institution was preparing students for the B.A. examinations in English, Sanskrit, Political Science, Economics, and Political Philosophy, History, and Persian by the year 1920, as well as the B.Sc. examinations in Mathematics, Physics, and Chemistry. A Commerce Department was established in 1939. The college now has 15 departments, each of which is equipped with highly competent teaching and nonteaching staff, libraries, and labs to meet the needs of todays students. The Ministry of Human Resource Development chose the college in 2013 as the best fit for its Community College Scheme pilot project. As a result, the Community College of City College is on its way to become a new destination in the state for job-oriented specialties. Several luminaries as scions of Bengal Renaissance including Deshbandhu Chittaranjan Das, Sir Surendranath Bandyopadhyay, Dr. Rajendra Prasad (Former President of India), Harendra Kumar Mukhopadhyay (Former Governor of West Bengal), Umesh Chandra Dutta, Bhashacharya Suniti Kumar Chattopadhyay, Jibanananda Das and Muhammad Shahidulla taught at this College and did us a proud generation to follow. The City College was taken over by the Government of West Bengal in 2017, and it has been operating as one of the states aided colleges since then. Now, it has 860 students, 102 faculty members, 22 non-teaching Staff, and 7 casual employees.

8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

1. The College has plans to make the campus "Plastic-free" zone and the college is taking substantial initiatives to ensure its proper implementation. In addition, the college also has a plan to declare the campus as "smoke-free" and to implement the same with strict regulation. Teachers, non-teaching staff, and students are all barred from smoking inside the college grounds. At all levels, serious attempts would be made to implement the same. 2. College will set up water purifiers or water coolers on various floors as well as in various departments. We will be able to deliver filtered cool drinking water to all stakeholders once the project is completed. Providing pure and safe drinking water to all students, faculty, and other college-affiliated bodies is a prime concern for us. 3. Our institution is located on the side of a very busy road, and we see a lot of traffic during the day, particularly during college hours. To make it safe and convenient for our students as well as the general public, we need to build a Pedestrian-friendly sidewalk, a Zebra-crossing on the road in front of the campus in collaboration with Kolkata Traffic Police and Amherst Street Police Station, as well as a few Speed breakers, to lower car speed and eliminate inadvertent collisions. A No-horn zone sign has also been placed on the route to raise public awareness and prevent interruptions caused by the highpitched sound from automobiles.
