"When you're really hungry, my parents told me as a child, 'you'll eat just about anything," recollects Somrita Urni Ganguly. In her Introduction to this anthology, Somrita writes, "Food has been at the centre of our literature from the time we started recording our thoughts. Our language is too full of metaphors for eating. The greatest epics ever told – both religious and secular, oral and written – have invested long verses on food: its politics, its culture, and its identity. Turkish delights from *The Chronicles of Narnia*, butterbeer from *Harry Potter*, the elaborate suppers in Enid Blyton, and the mad Hatter's tea-parties have fired the imagination of children and adults alike."

Throwing light on the inception of this anthology, Somrita admits, "Many months ago, a poet from Ghana told me that I write deliciously about food. This book of poems germinated from that generous comment." However, she also adds that the volume is rooted in our present moment because "we are living in times when people are increasingly coming under the scanner for their eating habits as they try to fight against the tyranny of imposed food choices."
