Established 1881

With ahundred and fifty years of élan and excellence, City College, Calcutta is a name in intelligentsia to boastfully enjoy the glory of the Bengal Renaissance which enlightened the entire country.

Tradition and modernity, legacy and technology, history and vision have put the college as an institution on the educational map of the country creating an Indian Diasporas across the world. Since the first NAAC accreditation in 2007, the college has been in gradual progression and takes various steps for implementing diverse value enhancement processes during the post-accreditation period.

The City College originated from a seabed of widespread educational movement in Bengal towards the latter part of the 19th century by the magnanimous members of the "Sadharan Brahmo Samaj". Since then, the Brahmo Samaj Education Society (BSES) with its illustrious background in the field of education has been entrusted with an extraordinary role to elevate the City College to its zenith as a seat of learning. During the period when onlya few Government educational institutes were present and those were exclusively for the children of rich and well-off families and studying in the Government schools and colleges was the day-dream of the innumerable students belonging to underprivileged families, BSES came forward and started its journey by establishing a number of educational institutions for the marginalized middle class of Bengal. The dream came true with the establishment of City College which started as a High school by Anandamohan Bose, the first Wranglerof Bengal, on 6th January 1879. The wholehearted support and **Pandit** Shastri and assistance from Shivnath Rastraguru Surendranath **Bandyopadhyay** made the road smooth for establishing the school. The school was opened with the objective of educating Indian students irrespective of castes and creeds on an improved and comprehensive plan. Academic learning for degrees was not the end result in the aim but the school also had a strong motivation in educating a student to become a perfect and ideal man to the society. Gradually the school improved to meet all the requirements of a university affiliation.

In 1881, the City school was expanded to a first-grade college. **Sir Alfred Croft** (the then Director of Public Institutions) observed in his official report that 'the unaided City College of Calcutta occupied a unique and distinguished position in regard to the reading of science'.

By the year 1920, the college was preparing students for the B.A. examination in English, Sanskrit, Political Economy and Political Philosophy, History and Persian and also for the B. Sc. Examination in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry. In 1939, a Commerce Departmentwas opened. This was followed by the inauguration of the Women's department in 1943.

Now there are 15 departments in the college and each department is equipped with highly qualified teaching, non-teaching staff, libraries and laboratories as par requirement of the present day.

In 2013, the Ministry of Human Resource Development selected the college suitable forrunning its pilot project of Community College scheme. As a result, the 'Community Collegeof City College' is now en route to a new destination for job-oriented disciplines in the state.

Several luminaries as scions of Bengal Renaissance including *Deshbandhu Chitta* Ranjan Das, Sir Surendranath Bandyopadhyay, Dr. Rajendra Prasad (Former President of India), Harendra Kumar Mukhopadhyay (Former Governor of West Bengal), Umesh Chandra Dutta, Bhashacharya Suniti Kumar Chattopadhyay, Jibanananda Das and Muhammad Shahidulla taught at this College and did us a proudgeneration to follow.

Under the careful guidance of **BSES**, City College from its modest start has grown into a mighty institution during the last 140 years. It gradually attains a highly glorious position in the sphere of higher education in Bengal and has planned to augment further to join the raceof fast-moving advances of science, technology and education in all spheres of life.

In 2017, the Government of West Bengal took over the administration of the City Collegeand since then it is running as one of the aided colleges of West Bengal.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



Regulations relating to Admission for the semester wise <u>Three-Year B.A./B.Sc. (Multidisciplinary,</u> under CCF, 2022) Courses of Studies conducted by the University of Calcutta.

- ❖ In exercise of the powers conferred by Section-54 of Calcutta University Act 1979, the University of Calcutta hereby makes the following Regulations for <u>B.A./ B.Sc. (Multidisciplinary) courses of studies (under CCF, 2022).</u>
- These shall apply to every student prosecuting the above Courses in this University.
- Notwithstanding anything contained in any other regulations or rules for the time being in force the study for the above Courses shall be guided by these Regulations effective from the Academic Session 2023-2024.

1. Title and Commencement

- 1.1 These Regulations shall be called THE REGULATIONS FOR SEMESTER WISE 3 YEAR B.A./B.Sc.(Multidisciplinary) DEGREE PROGRAMME under CCF (CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK), UNIVERSITY OF CALCUTTA.
- 1.2 These Regulations shall come into force with effect from the academic session 2023-2024.

2. Duration of the Programme

The B.A./ B.Sc. Programme shall be for a minimum duration of six (06) consecutive semesters (with an exit option after 2nd and 4th) of six months each, i.e. The odd semester will start ordinarily in the month of July and the even semester in the month of January of every year.

A student prosecuting a regular course of study for semester wise degree course shall have to clear all semesters in all respect within a span of <u>seven years</u> from the year of admission to the particular course and combination, failing which *enrolment of the student shall stand cancelled*.

Explanation: A student already admitted in this course may seek fresh admission with different course/ subject combination (with respect to Core/ Minor subjects) subject to clause no 4.

3. Applicability of the Regulations:

- a) These regulations shall be applicable to the students taking admission to the B.A./ B.Sc. Course from the academic session 2023-2024.
- b) Students who have already successfully completed any U.G. degree earlier are not eligible to take admission into above course.

I-Admission Regulations

4.(a) A student who has passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) or its equivalent Examination is eligible to seek admission to the 1st year of the B.A./B.Sc. (Multidisciplinary) Course of Studies provided the student has also passed in English having full marks not being less than 100 and fulfills the conditions as laid down in clause 5, 10, 11 and 12.

Students who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Vocational examination conducted by the West Bengal State Council of Vocational Education and Training shall be eligible to seek admission to the B.A. (Multidisciplinary) 1st year Course of Studies taking the subjects under **Humanities Discipline** only.

However, no student shall be allowed admission after a lapse of more than 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination.

(Explanation: The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating three years from the year of passing the previous qualifying Examination).

- (b) Students who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination or its equivalent from the All India Boards/Councils (i.e. CBSE, ISC and National Institute of Open Schooling) need not require to submit the Migration Certificate for getting Registration under this University.
- 5. For the purpose of determining eligibility for admission to the B.A./B.Sc. (Multidisciplinary) Courses, aggregate marks shall be calculated by adding the marks in top-four subjects in order of marks secured by a student. However, marks in compulsory Environmental Education/Studies shall not be taken into account for calculation of aggregate marks. However, if the subject "Environmental Science" is studied as an elective subject of 100 marks, it may be taken into account for the purpose of determining the aggregate marks.

Seat reservation for admission in the first year class of three-year (six semesters) degree courses of studies shall be guided by the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission), Act, 2013 and the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Rules, 2014 and Memorandum No. 339-Edn (CS)/OM-74L/2023, dt. 26.05.2023.

6. Attendance

- **6.1** A student attending at least 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- **6.2** A student attending at least 60% but less than 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to the payment of prescribed condonation fees and fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.

6.3 A student attending less than 60% of the total number of classes* held shall not be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations and he /she has to take admission to the same Semester in the very next year for attending the classes and appearing at the said Semester Examination.

*Such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or date of admission, whichever is later.

Explanation: A student who has not been eligible to appear at any Semester-end Examination in terms of Clause 6.3 may take admission to the next higher Semester and appear at such higher Semester-end Examinations. However, such student has to take admission to the concerned Semester, for which the student has been ineligible under clause 6.3, in the very next available chance without pursuing any other Semester Course simultaneously.

7. Disciplines of Multidisciplinary courses for B.A./B.Sc.:

- (i) <u>Humanities Discipline</u>: History, English, Bengali, Ancient Indian & World History, Islamic History and Culture, Hindi, Urdu, Russian, Political Science, Sanskrit, Pali, Philosophy, Sociology, Education, Arabic, Persian, Journalism & Mass Communication, French, Music, Linguistics, Physical Education, Human Rights, Women Studies.
- (ii) <u>Science Discipline</u>: Physics, Zoology, Chemistry, Botany, Molecular Biology, Microbiology, Geology, Geography, Physiology, Defence Studies, Computer Science, Electronics, Bio-Chemistry, Physical Education, Environmental Science, Economics, Statistics, Mathematics, Anthropology, Psychology, Film Studies.
- (iii) <u>Home Science Discipline</u>: Food & Nutrition, Household Art, Human Development, Social Science, Home Science Extension Education, , Library and Information Studies.

8. <u>Outline of CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK (CCF):</u> <u>Category of subjects:</u>

A) <u>Core Course (CC)</u>: Courses, to be compulsorily studied by a student as the requirement of Core subjects.

In order to make different Multidisciplinary subject combinations, the subjects of all the discipline have been taken together to create 8 smaller Multidisciplinary pools. The student shall select 3 subjects as core subjects taking not more than one subject from each pool.

- B) Minor: A subject to be studied by the student with lesser number of courses than the two core subjects.
- C) <u>Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)</u>: AEC courses are the courses based on the knowledge of languages. There shall be two AEC Courses:
 - a) Compulsory English
 - b) MIL/ Alternative English
 - MIL includes: Bengali, Hindi & Urdu.

- D) <u>Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)</u>: These courses are designed to provide skill-based knowledge and are aimed at providing competencies, skills etc. SEC courses are based upon skill enhancement. The students shall study 3 SECs 2 from each of 2 core subjects in 1st and 2nd semester respectively and in 3rd semester 1 SEC from the Minor subject.
- E) <u>Practical/ Tutorial</u>: All courses other than AEC & CVAC will have one Practical/ Tutorial. Wherever there is a practical, there will be no Tutorial and vice-versa. P/TU components in SECs will be as mentioned in the syllabus of the respective subject.
- F) <u>Common Value Added Course (CVAC)</u>: These courses are based on Knowledge of Human & Social Values. There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & one compulsory CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.
- G) <u>Summer Internship</u>: All the students are required to do one 3 credits Summer Internship at the end of the 2nd or 4th or 6th semester. Students completing Internship at the end of the 2nd semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Certificate of 45 (42+3) credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 4th semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Diploma of 88 (85+3) credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 6th semester and after successful completion of all the 6 semesters will be awarded B.A./ B.Sc. Degree of 128 (125+3) credits.
- H) <u>Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC)</u>: There shall be 3 IDCs of 3 credits each, to be studied in the first 3 semesters. The students shall select IDCs from the subjects other than the concerned core subjects & minor, not more than one from the each of the Multidisciplinary pool (clause no. 12)

9. Disciplines:

There will be three broad disciplines: Humanities, Science and Home Science, as described in clause no. (7).

Types of subjects:

- i) <u>Core Courses:</u> All students shall have to take 16 (sixteen) Core Courses from 2 (two) subjects taking 8 (eight) from each core subjects.
- ii) Minor course: A subject to be studied by the student with lesser number of courses other than the two core subjects. All students shall have to study 6 (six) courses from Minor subject.
- iii) Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC): A student will have to opt for three IDCs (one in each of the first three semesters) from a pool of subjects offered by the different disciplines. These courses must be different from the Core & Minor subjects.
- iv) <u>Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)</u>: SEC courses are based upon skill enhancement. The students shall study 3 SECs 1 from each of 2 core and 1 minor subject taken.

Course structure (Th, P, Tu) and credit distributions (4 TH +0P/TU; 0 TH+4P; 2 TH+2 P/TU; 3 TH+ 1 P/TU) may differ from subject to subject.

Note: There shall be no course containing only Tutorial.

v) Common Value Added Course (CVAC):

There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & one CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.

vi) Ability Enhancement Course (AEC):

All students shall have to study 4 AEC courses of 2 credits each (one in each of the first 4 semesters). There will be a compulsory AEC, named compulsory English which shall be studied in the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} semesters and there will be an optional AEC (MIL/ Alt. Eng) to be studied in the 3^{rd} & 4^{th} semesters.

- iii. 50% marks in the aggregate when the student has not studied the subject in his/her previous qualifying examination provided all other clauses are satisfied.
- (b) Students belonging to Reserved Categories taking up Major Course of Study must have obtained a minimum of 40% marks in the aggregate or 40% marks in the subject or related subjects at the previous qualifying examination, as the case may be.
- (c) Seat reservation for admission in the first year class of four-year (eight semesters) degree courses of studies shall be guided by the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission), Act, 2013 and the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Rules, 2014 and Memorandum No. 339-Edn (CS)/OM-74L/2023, dt. 26.05.2023.

6. Attendance

- **6.1.** A student attending at least 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- **6.2.** A student attending at least 60% but less than 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to the payment of prescribed condonation fees and fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- **6.3.** A student attending less than 60% of the total number of classes* held shall not be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations and he /she has to take admission to the same Semester in the very next year for attending the classes and appearing at the said Semester Examination.
- *Such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or date of admission, whichever is later.

Explanation: A student who has not been eligible to appear at any Semester-end Examination in terms of Clause 6.3 may take admission to the next higher Semester and appear at such higher Semester-end Examinations. However, such student has to take admission to the concerned Semester, for which the candidate has been ineligible under clause 6.3, in the very next available chance without pursuing any other Semester Course simultaneously.

7. Disciplines of Major & Minor subjects for B.A./ B.Sc.:

- (ii) <u>Science Discipline:</u> Physics, Zoology, Chemistry, Botany, Molecular Biology, Microbiology, Geology, Physiology, Defence Studies, Computer Science, Electronics, Bio-Chemistry, Physical Education, Environmental Science, Food and Nutrition, Household Art, Human Development, Social Science, Home Science Extension Education, Economics, Statistics, Mathematics, Anthropology, Geography, Psychology, Library and Information Studies, Film Studies.

8. Outline of CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK (CCF):

Category of subjects:

- A) <u>Discipline Specific Core Course (DSCC)</u>: A course, to be compulsorily studied by a student as a core requirement of the Major subject.
- B) Minor: A subject of same broad discipline to be studied by the student with lesser number of courses other than the major subject.
- C) <u>Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)</u>: Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) courses are the courses based on the knowledge of languages. There shall be two AEC courses:
 - a) Compulsory English

- F) <u>Common Value Added Course (CVAC)</u>: These courses are based on Knowledge of Human & Social Values. There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & one compulsory CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.
- **G)** Summer Internship: All the students are required to do one 3 credits Summer Internship at the end of the 2nd or 4th or 6th semester. Students completing Internship at the end of the 2nd semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Certificate of 45 credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 4th semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Diploma of 88 credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 6th semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded three-year Single major Degree of 132 credits.
- H) <u>Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC)</u>: There shall be 3 IDCs of 3 credits each, to be studied in the first 3 semesters. The students shall take IDC from the different subjects other than the Major and Minor subjects.

I) Research/ Dissertation:

- a) Students obtaining CGPA equivalent to 75% marks after successful completion of all the first 6 semesters may opt for Honours with research Degree Course in the 7th & 8th Semester.

10. Disciplines:

There will be two broad disciplines: i) Science and ii) Humanities & Languages as described in clause no. (8).

Types of subjects:

i) Major Courses:

All students shall have to take 22 DSCs of one subject. In addition, students who do not qualify or opt for "4-year degree course-by research, will have to take three additional courses with provision for project based evaluation (As mentioned in the syllabus of respective subject).

Although the course contents of all minor courses are identical with some major courses of that subject, the examinations for Major and Minor courses will be conducted separately.

A college shall offer Major Courses only in such subjects in respect of which it has affiliation for Single major courses.

ii) Minor Courses:

Course content to be the same, as Major Courses of a given standard.

A student will have to take 8 Minor Courses from the same broad discipline_as the Major excluding the Major subject. Students have to study 4 Minor Courses in the first two years (1 in each semester) and 4 Minor courses in the 3rd year (2 in each semester).

Of the 4 courses in the first two years2 courses have to be taken from one subject (m1) in the 1st and 2nd semesters and 2 courses from the other subject (m2) in the 3rd and 4th semesters. All these courses are intended to be at level 100.

The exact Minor courses are specified in the syllabus of respective subjects. For any minor subject the first two minor courses (irrespective of whether it is taught in 1st or 2nd year) will be identical with the first two courses of the corresponding major subject.

In the third year (semester-5 & 6) two minor subjects in each semester will have to be taken from two different subjects. These courses are of level 200.

A minor course opted for in the 5^{th} semester will have to be selected from among the major courses offered in the 3^{rd} semester level (level 200).

Similarly a minor course opted in the 6th semester will have to be selected from among the major courses offered in the 4th semester (level 200).

iii) Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC):

A student will have to opt for three IDCs (one in each of the first three semesters) from a pool of courses offered in the different disciplines. These courses must be different from the major and minor subject.

iv) Skill Enhancement Course (SEC):

SEC courses are based upon skill enhancement. Student shall study 2 SECs based on Major subjects in 1^{st} and 3^{rd} semester. In the 2^{nd} semester the student can study Artificial Intelligence (for Science discipline) or Digital Empowerment (for Humanities & Language discipline) or as specified in the syllabus of the concerned Major subject.

Course structure (Th, P, Tu) and credit distributions (4 TH +0P/TU; 0 TH+4P; 2 TH+2 P/TU; 3 TH+ 1 P/TU) may differ from subject to subject.

Note: There shall be no course containing only Tutorial.

v) Common Value Added Course (CVAC):

There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & one CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.

vi) Ability Enhancement Course (AEC):

All students shall have to study 4 AEC courses of 2 credits each (one in each of the first 4 semesters). There will be a compulsory AEC, named Compulsory English which shall be studied in the 1st and 2nd semesters and there will be an optional AEC (MIL/ Alt. Eng) to be studied in the 3rd & 4th semesters.

Regulations relating to Admission for the semester wise Four-Year B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. (Honours with a core vocational subject) (under CCF, 2022) Courses of Studies conducted by the University of Calcutta.

- ❖ In exercise of the powers conferred by Section-54 of Calcutta University Act 1979, the University of Calcutta hereby makes the following Regulations for B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. (Honours with a Core Vocational subject) courses of studies (under CCF, 2022).
- ❖ These shall apply to every student prosecuting the above Courses in this University.
- Notwithstanding anything contained in any other regulations or rules for the time being in force the study for the above Courses shall be guided by these Regulations effective from the Academic Session 2023-2024.

1. Title and Commencement

- 1.1 These Regulations shall be called THE REGULATIONS FOR SEMESTER WISE 4 YEAR <u>B.A./</u> <u>B.Sc./ B.Com.(Honours with a Core Vocational subject)</u> DEGREE PROGRAMME under <u>CCF,</u> 2022 (CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK), UNIVERSITY OF CALCUTTA.
- 1.2 These Regulations shall come into force with effect from the academic session 2023-2024.

2. Duration of the Programme:

The B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com.(Honours with a core vocational subject) Programme shall be for a minimum duration of Eight (08) (with an exit option after completion of 2nd/4th/6th Semesters) consecutive semesters of Six months each, i.e. The odd semester will start ordinarily in the month of July and the even semester in the month of January of every year.

A student prosecuting a regular course of study for semester wise degree course shall have to clear all semesters in all respect within a span of <u>seven years</u> from the year of admission to the particular course and combination, failing which *enrolment of the student shall stand cancelled*.

Explanation: A student already admitted in this course may seek fresh admission with different course/ subject combination (with respect to Course or Subject combination) subject to clause no 4.

3. Applicability of the Regulations:

These regulations shall be applicable to the students taking admission to the B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com.(Honours with a core vocational subject)

- a) Course from the academic session 2023-2024.
- b) Students who have already successfully completed any U.G. degree earlier are not eligible to take admission into above course.

I-Admission Regulations

4. (a) A student who has passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) or its equivalent Examination is eligible to seek admission to the 1st year of the B.A./B.Sc./ B.Com. (Honours with a core vocational subject) Course of Studies provided the candidate has also passed in English having full marks not being less than 100 and fulfills the conditions as laid down in clause **5,7** and **13**.

However, no student shall be allowed to take admission after a lapse of more than 3 years from the year of passing the previous qualifying examination.

(Explanation: The year of admission shall not be taken into account while calculating three years from the year of passing the previous qualifying Examination).

- 4. (b) Students who have passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination or its equivalent from the All India Boards/ Councils (i.e. CBSE, ISC and National Institute of Open Schooling) need not require to submit the Migration Certificate for getting Registration under this University.
- 5. For the purpose of determining eligibility for admission to the B.A./ B.Sc./ B.Com. (Honours with a core vocational subject) Courses, aggregate marks shall be calculated by adding the marks in top-four subjects in order of marks secured by a student. However, marks in compulsory Environmental Education/Studies shall not be taken into account for calculation of aggregate marks. However, if the subject "Environmental Science" is studied as an elective subject of 100 marks, it may be taken into account for the purpose of determining the aggregate marks.

(a) A student taking up Core Vocational Course in a subject must have obtained:

- i. A minimum of 45% marks in the aggregate at the previous qualifying examination.
- ii. Students belonging to Reserved Categories taking up Major Course of Study must have obtained a minimum of 40% marks in the aggregate at the previous qualifying examination.
- (b) Seat reservation for admission in the first year class of four-year (eight semesters) degree courses of studies shall be guided by the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission), Act, 2013 and the West Bengal State Higher Educational Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Rules, 2014 and Memorandum No. 339-Edn (CS)/OM-74L/2023, dt. 26.05.2023.

6. Attendance

- **6.1.** A student attending at least 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to fulfillment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- **6.2.** A student attending at least 60% but less than 75% of the total number of classes* held shall be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations subject to the payment of prescribed condonation fees and fulfilment of other conditions laid down in the regulations.
- **6.3.** A student attending less than 60% of the total number of classes* held shall not be allowed to sit for the concerned Semester Examinations and he /she has to take admission to the same Semester in the very next year for attending the classes and appearing at the said Semester Examination.

*Such attendance will be calculated from the date of commencement of classes or date of admission, whichever is later.

Explanation: A student who has not been eligible to appear at any Semester-end Examination in terms of Clause 6.3 may take admission to the next higher Semester and appear at such higher Semester-end Examinations. However, such student has to take admission to the concerned Semester, for which the candidate has been ineligible under clause 6.3, in the very next available chance without pursuing any other Semester Course simultaneously.

10. Outline of CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK (CCF):

Category of subjects:

- A) <u>Core Vocational Course (CVC)</u>: A course, to be compulsorily studied by a student as a core requirement of the Vocational subject.
- B) <u>Minor</u>: A subject to be studied by the student with lesser number of courses other than the Core Vocational subject. There shall be 2 minor subjects.
- C) <u>Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)</u>: Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) courses are the courses based on the knowledge of languages. There shall be two AEC courses:
 - a) Compulsory English
 - b) MIL/ Alternative English
 - MIL includes: Bengali, Hindi & Urdu.
- D) <u>Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)</u>: These courses are designed to provide skill-based knowledge and are aimed at providing competencies, skills etc. SEC courses are based upon skill enhancement. Student shall study 3 SECs based on Core Vocational subject in first 3 semesters.
- E) <u>Practical/ Tutorial</u>: All courses other than AEC & CVAC will have one Practical/ Tutorial. Wherever there is a practical, there will be no Tutorial and vice-versa. Inclusion of P/TU components in SECs will be as mentioned in the syllabus.

- F) <u>Common Value Added Course (CVAC)</u>: These courses are based on Knowledge of Human & Social Values. There shall be 4 CVAC courses of 2 credits each. In the 1st semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & one compulsory CVAC in Constitutional Values. In the 2nd semester there shall be 1 compulsory CVAC in ENVS & the students shall select the other CVAC from a pool of courses.
- **G)** <u>Summer Internship</u>: All the students are required to do one 3 credits Summer Internship at the end of the 2nd or 4th or 6th semester. Students completing Internship at the end of the 2nd semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Certificate of 45 credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 4th semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded Diploma of 88 credits. Students completing Internship at the end of the 6th semester will be allowed to take exit from the course and will be awarded three-year Degree of 132 credits.
- **H)** Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC): There shall be 3 IDCs of 3 credits each, to be studied in the first 3 semesters. The students shall take IDCS from three subjects (one from each) mentioned in the list of the IDC subjects (clause no. 10) other than the selected Minor subjects mention.
- I) 7th Semester Internship: A 12 (Twelve) weeks Internship based on the Core Vocational subjects with 16 credits.
- J) <u>8th Semester Project & Viva</u>: A 16 credits project based on the core vocational subject along with a 4 credit Project-viva.

Department of Sanskrit

The department of Sanskrit is one of the oldest department of City College. It started functioning from the year 1884. From the very commencement, its students headed the B.A. (Hons.) list in the Calcutta University in English, History & Sanskrit. Till now the department of this college is going on smoothly with Honours and General students per year. Some of the eminent ex-teachers of this department are Prof Dr. Murari Mohan Bhattacharya, Prof Dr. Alpana Goswami among many others. Apart from that, many guest lecturers joined in our department and taught our departmental students for many years.

<u>Present Faculty Members</u>: Present full-time faculty members are - Dr. (Mrs.) Madhumita Deb Roy (Barman), Ms. Aradhana Murmu, Dr. Rupali Murmu and SACT faculty members are - Smt. Shampa Basu, Smt. Anamika Mukherjee and Sri Subhadeep Roy.

Teaching Method & Activities:

- Apart from the lecture method, we advocate the practice of learner centric teaching methods. Thus, students are encouraged to arrange short seminars and to take part in group discussions. Sometimes we used **ICT tools** for effective teaching.
- We provide online classes alongwith offline classes to help slow learners. After completing the syllabus, we also arrange more offline classes for our students to make them understand syllabus well.
- We have arranged **Value Added Course** in our department. Students have got benefited by doing this course. We have arranged many **Seminars** in our department occasionally. Students also presented their papers in the Seminars.
- In spite of that, we do **Educational Excursion** occasionally for our students. It helps them to get acquainted with their syllabus.

<u>Faculty Member's Participation</u>: The faculty members are constantly participating in Seminar, Short Term Courses and Workshops organized by the colleges and universities under U.G.C.

<u>Subject's Outcome</u>: If we want to explore the ancient India, we must have to learn Sanskrit. Modern Scholars think that emergence of Rigveda, the oldest literature of Indo-European language group, is probably in 1500 BC. Rikveda along with other three Vedas are written in Vedic Language, has been continued up to 6th Century BC. After that this Vedic Language has been converted into Classical Sanskrit Language.

In ancient time, literature, culture, social custom, law, litigation, religion etc were written in Sanskrit Language. Famous great grammarian Panini of 4th century BC. has written his famous grammar book Ashtadhyayi in Sanskrit language. He wrote sutras in Sanskrit Language in such a beautiful way, that till now the importance of this language is acceptable to all. After Vedic period, Ramayana, Mahabharata, and Purana also are written in Sanskrit Language. After that, many renowned Sanskrit writers like Bhasa, Kalidasa, Bhavabhuti, Banabhatta etc have written their famous kavyas and dramas in Sanskrit Language. Apart from these, there are many Sastras which are written by many eminent Scholars in this language.

We must learn Sanskrit very well to know about the flavour of our country. During British rule, three Universities have been established for expansion of higher education. Kolkata University is amongst them. Sanskrit language is taught in master's degree course alongwith other subjects there. Now Sanskrit is taught in Honours and General stream in undergraduate Colleges and master's degree course can be done in Sanskrit in Universities. Toll system also is there to learn Sanskrit to get Shastri and Acharya degree. There are many

Sanskrit Universities in different parts of India where toll system has been introduced. Students who have passed Higher Secondary Examination can take admission in Sanskrit in Undergraduate Colleges.UGC has arranged 2 types of NET Examination system for those candidates also who have got Shastri and Acharya degree. After achieving masters or Acharya degree, students should pass NET for teaching in any College or University of India. Students can get Junior Research Fellowship if they crack NET. They can earn 6 lakhs yearly as UGC Fellowship if they get chance in NET. After getting masters or Acharya degree, they can do research in any subject throughout the World. Sanskrit students can do research in various aspects like South Asian study, ancient Theology, comparative Mythology, Linguistics, Indology in various Universities and Research Institutes. Students can do research in Vedic Literature, Sanskrit Literature, Dramaturgy, Indian philosophy like Nyaya, Sankhya, Yoga etc, Grammar, Linguistics, Manuscriptology, Inscription, Ayurveda and Vastu Sastra.

<u>Student's Future</u>: Sanskrit Honours General both Students can take admission in Government approved master's degree Colleges and UGC approved Universities. This subject is taught in different Colleges in Kolkata, Howrah, South 24 Parganas and Colleges under Calcutta University and other Universities. Students can do Master's degree, M.Phil and Ph.D in Sanskrit most of all Universities in West Bengal and outside of West Bengal.

After Graduation in Sanskrit, anyone who is interested to teach in school, can do B.Ed. Or they can sit for State or Central Government approved Civil Service Examination. Sanskrit Language can be taken as optional subject in Public Service Commission and Central Government approved UPSC Examination. Anyone who is interested to be an IAS Officer, can opt for Sanskrit as one of the subject for cracking WBCS Exam or UPSC Exam as Sanskrit is a very much scoring subject. So he can have the Opportunity to get more marks in Sanskrit than other subjects. These two types of Competitive Examination syllabus are allied with master's degree syllabus of UGC approved Universities. Apart from this, one can get professor post in College Service Commission or Public Service Commission after doing higher studies in Sanskrit. Anyone can get Central Government job in Museum or Tourism after passing Sanskrit. He can join as a Sanskrit Translator in Government based Judiciary. If anyone do master's degree in Sanskrit, he can get job of a librarian in Manuscript section or in Archaeology Department. Students can sit for any type of competitive Examination like Railway, Bank or any other Corporate Sector after passing Sanskrit in UG or PG.

Department of Zoology

The Department of Zoology is one of the oldest departments of the City College. It started its journey way back in 1939, and has been one of the pioneer departments in science. At the beginning, The Zoology Department was a part of Bioscience Department with Prof. Hemendra Chandra Mukherjee as the Head of the Department. In 1956, the Bioscience Department took a giant leap in starting Zoology Honours course with Dr. N. M. Basu as the Head of the Department. At that time the faculty was very much enriched by the aggregation of excellent teaching and non-teaching staff. The tradition is still continuing. The Department has top reputation in the College with dedicated faculty members with vast knowledge, experience in their respective fields of specialization. Apart from teaching in the under-graduate course, the teachers are also involved in Post graduate teaching in different Post graduate colleges/institutions. They are actively involved in research works, with regular participation in International/National/State Level scientific conferences, seminars, workshops etc. to keep themselves updated with newer advancement and discoveries in Biological sciences, as evident from a number of research papers published in different International Journals with few undergraduate text books and book chapters by the faculties. Consistently our students keep us proud with their excellent results in the university examinations.

The department is actively involved in organizing Seminars by Eminent Speakers and Students, Workshops, Hands-on Training Programmes, Environmental Awareness Programmes, Field Study and Excursions etc. for the overall academic and scientific developments.

Overview

The Department offered a 3 Years Under-Graduate Degree Course of Studies with Zoology as an Honours or as a General Subject to the students previously with the 2+1 system then the 1+1+1 system from 2009-2010 academic session and presently the Department offers the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) with 6 Semesters from 2018-2019 academic session, as per the curricula of the University of Calcutta. Learning Outcome

The subject Zoology is not a single subject; rather, in true sense, it is a very vast field to explore. It deals with studying the animal kingdom, their origin on earth; their natural habitats, behavioural and ecological roles they play, the diversity of the animal world and their conservation strategies, their interactions with other wildlife, mutuals, commensals and parasites, their physiological, biochemical and hormonal interplay and influence of genetic potential on them, their various ways of adaptations, which may lead to the evolution and creation of new species, approaches and applications of various molecular biology and biotechnological tools and techniques towards the remediation and eradication of various disorders and diseases to improve the quality of life etc. All these factual studies can be considered under a single umbrella known as "ZOOLOGY". It is not only a subject for students rather it is a subject for all, because the human being be exemplified as the most advanced creature of the Zoological World.

Why Study Zoology?

- Zoology should not be considered as a bookish subject only, rather it should be considered as a vast field
 to explore with multifaceted and inimitable genres, such as Cell Biology, Physiology, Biochemistry,
 Genetics, Molecular Biology, Biotechnology, Anatomy, Parasitology, Immunology, Endocrinology,
 Neurobiology, Ethology, Developmental Biology, Marine Biology, Ecology, Biodiversity &
 Conservation to name a few.
- Zoologists can also study animals at the level of the cell, organ systems, whole animals, animal communities or whole ecosystems.
- Zoologists can consequently be divided and classified on the basis of their area of speciality. For example, an Anatomist studies the body organisation of animals, an Ethologist studies behavioural attributes of animals, a Physiologist studies how animals work, a Neuro-biologist studies how do animals

coordinate and become responsive differentially against different stimuli and an Ecologists study how animals interact with their environment and other animals in it.

- Some zoologists work in "pure" fields whereas others work in "applied" fields. Pure, basic or fundamental science can be interpreted as "science for its own sake" and is concerned with increasing the knowledge of how living things sustain their lives, but it also provides the scope of thoughts for applied science. Applied science, as its name suggests, involves applying scientific knowledge to specific problems. Many studies that fall into the applied sciences have major implications for man and the environment. Fisheries & Aquaculture, Sericulture, Apiculture, Lac-culture, Vermiculture, Pearl-culture, Poultry, Dairy, Piggery etc. are a few descendant applied fields from the Mother Zoology.

Teaching accessories: Classes are conducted with Chalks & Dusters, using the Black-boards and with Board Markers, using the White-boards as the facility available in the specified class-rooms by the faculties for regular class-room teaching.

Apart from this, overhead projectors and LCD projectors with Screens are also used for teaching in the classes if required by the faculties for better understanding of some topics by the students, as audiovisual modes of demonstration form an important aspect of teaching methodologies.

Seminar Library: A vast collection (approximately 400) of modern and classical books for both honours and General students is available in the departmental library, which is able to accommodate the requisition of students as well as faculties at free accessibility to consult anytime of the working day. The lending facility for the books is also available in the Department under the supervision of designated faculty members.

Museum: The Department of Zoology possesses an enriched Museum with a wide collection of preserved Animal Specimens (approximately 300)) and many of which were collected and preserved by the departmental faculties and students: bones, histological slides, slides with microorganisms, parasites, larval forms, embryonic developmental stages (a total of more than 100 slides, approximately), Models of Internal Organs, Charts displaying various organ systems of some Model animals, etc.

The Department of Zoology organizes "World Biodiversity Day", which must be distinctively appreciated in a way that the students of the department are well aware of the importance of Biodiversity to sustain life on this Earth, and this kind of awareness can be an way to make the world free from diseases and other environmental threats.

Best Practices

Academic

Experimental Learning through Educational Excursion, Environmental Audit and Field work: Each year, students of both Zoology Honours and General Stream are taken to areas with special Ecological Profiles, Topography, Climate and Enriched Floral and Faunal Diversity to enhance their practical knowledge through interaction with animal worlds, animal habitats, animal behaviour, environment, zone specific biodiversity etc. Their experiences are expressed through individually prepared reports. Here, students get chances to enhance their analytical power as well as their writing skills. Also the students of 2nd Year Zoology General (previously) and 4th Semester Zoology General (Presently) visit Zoological Garden, Alipore, Kolkata and Indian Museum, Kolkata, in each academic session to gather knowledge about Ex-situ Conservation process and Evolution of the animal world, as a part of their curriculum.

Academic Interaction

The department organises seminars where students are encouraged to select any topic of their choice and make a presentation within a stipulated time frame, and all our teaching faculties are there to assist them. Every presentation is followed by a thorough question answer session and discussion to reshuffle their concepts and also focusing on recent advancements of the subject/ topic as well as how to improve the presentation as a whole, which involves how to make a better presentation (PPT) together with delivering it in a better way. This activity/ exposure has always been an immense help for our students and helps boost their confidence and prepare them to speak in front of a larger audience. With time, they perform better and need less help from our side. Occasionally, we encourage them by selecting the best presenter for the session and greeting them. We have been fortunate to get pretty good presenters who have done very well, later on and have won several prizes for their presentations at different levels.

Organization of Seminars/Talks by Eminent Speakers

The Department organizes different seminars on a regular basis where Scientists from Research Institutes, Faculties of other colleges, Universities etc. deliver lectures on special, interesting, modern aspects of the subject Zoology.

Organizing Workshops

Workshops are organised regularly by the Department individually in college or in other colleges or in collaboration with other organizations on current/ modern laboratory techniques and hands-on training for students of same/other colleges.

Project Works by Students

Students are often allowed to be involved in different field-based educational training programme in other colleges and institutions. From such activities, they prepare individual projects on that. Besides that, students of Semester 5 and 6 (3rd year), academic session, 2021-2022, were also made involved in a Special Project work in Collaboration with World Wildlife Fund (WWF), India, entitled "Preparation of Bio-fertilizer from Daily Domestic Kitchen Wastes to Reduce the Unwanted Hazard of Chemical Fertilizer in the Environment, Surrounding Kolkata Metropolis a Basic Initiative", under the WWF-ECHO scheme "TRANSFORM BUSINESSES FOR A GREENER FUTURE".

Assessment of Academic Performance

A discussion is conducted after each class by all the faculty members to explain and clarify the students doubts about the topic taught.

Class tests for both theoretical and practical topics are being conducted periodically by each faculty member of the department in continuation of the completion of the allotted syllabi.

Remedial and Extra classes

Before the end of each academic session (Semester/Year), after completion of the allotted syllabi, extra classes on both Theory and Practical papers are being conducted by each faculty member as and when required to brush up the comparatively backward students for more and more practices to comply with their privation of academic intellect.

The Department of Zoology appreciates the excellence in academic performances of students' for securing the highest marks in the University of Calcutta with Zoology Honours (Cumulating 3 Years/6 Semesters) from the Department of Zoology, City College, Kolkata, by awarding them with Dr. N. M.

Department of Botany

The Department of Botany in City College started long back in the year 1939 and the honors course in the subject started in the year 1945, Prof. Hemendra Chandra Mukherjee as Head of the Department started the Department of Botany in the year 1939. In 1945 the department received the affiliation from Calcutta University to introduce Honours Course in Botany for 20 (twenty) students.

The Department currently has six full time teachers. All of them are Ph. D degree holders. In addition, the Dept has three part time teachers. The teachers are specialized in different areas of the subject and therefore, are perfectly competent to meet the demand of the learner. All the teachers, besides teaching, organize seminars and workshops.

The Department possesses a very long history in academic performance. A large number of proficient students have been produced by the Department, who had established themselves as crown of many institutions in different parts of the country as well as abroad. At present the department enrolls 30 students per year.

• Laboratories and Classrooms :

The Department of Botany has got sufficient facilities for teaching honours. There are four laboratories and two lecture rooms. In addition there is an air conditioned culture laboratory in the Department. The laboratories are well equipped to meet the demand of the honours curriculum. The teachers of the department uses following teaching aids in the classrooms:

- Computer & educational CDs

• Museum:

The museum of the Department of Botany is unique for its collections of various botanical specimens. Here several scientific models, dry and wet preserved specimens of algae, fungi, bryophytes, pteridophytes, gymnosperms, pathological specimens and palaeobotanical specimens are displayed in a proper order. These are utilized by the respective teachers in a class. Therefore, an interactive method of teaching is built up in the class between the teacher and student. Moreover during botanical excursions many specimens are collected from different ecological habitats and the unique ones are displayed in the museum. So the museum of this department is enriched and updated every year. The botanical museum gives a first hand knowledge of the subject and this type of a visual aid creates an everlasting impression in the minds of the students. Moreover the students are also made aware of, how the specimens are collected, preserved and maintained in the museum.

• Herbarium:

The herbarium is a pride of the Department of Botany. Each year the students of Botany actively participate in excursion trips and collect various plant species. Some species are kept in the Herbarium after proper treatment. The genera of the same family are kept in the common family cover. The families are arranged according to Bentham and Hooker's system of classification (1862-1883). The herbarium of Botany Department represents the flora of almost every phytogeographical regions of India.

• Seminar Library:

Seminar library is a small repository of books (about 300) in the department in addition to the central library. This library is maintained by a teacher of the department who also issue books to the students. A register is maintained to keep record of the books. Each student is allowed to keep the book with

them for a week. The main advantage of the seminar library is that while issuing a book, the students can directly interact with the teachers which they can not avail in the main library. This helps the teacher to keep a track on the student's progress.

• Botanical Excursion :

Botanical excursion is a part of the curriculum for both Botany Honours and General stream students of Calcutta University. The Department organizes long botanical excursions to different phytogeographical regions in India for the purpose of studying floral diversity in different natural habitats. In this process, the students become aware of the ecological importance and its interaction with plant community. In the current academic session, the department conduct botanical excursion to places like Jagadalpur (Chattisgarh), Araku and Vizag (Andhra Pradesh) with the 2nd yr Botany Honours students.

Similarly local excursions are conducted regularly by the Department for both Honors and General students in different local areas including Indian Botanic Garden, Howrah. Visit to Indian Botanic Garden is an annual fare for the students of Botany.

During excursion to other phyto-geographical regions the teachers and students of the Department interact with the local people and make them aware about the various reasons behind the loss of biological resources in those areas. They also suggest conservation measures for species, which are at high risk and to be conserved on priority basis.

• Wall Magazine:

The Department of Botany publishes wall magazine in the name "Calyx" by the departmental students.

Workshops & Seminars :

The Department of Botany organizes seminars and workshops every year to encourage students to learn the essence of the subject. Resource persons from different renowned Universities and Research Institutions are invited to facilitate the students an opportunity for exchange of knowledge.

• Students' Seminar:

The Department of Botany Organizes STUDENTS' SEMINAR keeping in mind the process of MICROTEACHING as a learning tool. All the students of this department participate as speakers. Students of 2nd year and 3rd year participated and presented topics what they study in their B.Sc. (Hons.) course. Different aspects of Plant Science are covered starting from the origin of ancient plant life to genetic engineering. Few of them went beyond the restriction of the syllabus which point towards the level of their enthusiasm.

Department of Physiology

The department of Physiology of City College, Kolkata is the second oldest department under the University of Calcutta achieving the glory of running B.Sc., Honours course successfully in West Bengal, India. It was started from the session 1964-65, although the subject Physiology was taught as a general (pass) subject before this time.

At present the department has six fulltime faculties holding the positions of Associate Professor and four par-time faculties. There are three full-time and one casual laboratory assistants.

Every year, 45 students get the opportunity for studying three-year Physiology Honours degree course and more than 100 students get admission for general course with the Physiology as one of the subsidiary subjects. The overall performance of our students is excellent.

At present the department has separate laboratories for both Honours and general students. There are laboratories like Histology, Biochemistry and Experimental Physiology. Experiments are done on both humanand animal subjects. There are separate computer room, seminar library, seminar room and a small conference room. Beside tight schedule of holding theoretical and practical classes the department performs several activities like:

- 1. Annual prize distribution ceremony of the department and scientific lecture in the memory of Dr. J. N. Mukherjee, founder and ex-Head of the department of Physiology. Dr. J. N. Mukherjee memorial award (a silver medal) is conferred to the student of Physiology honours securing highest marks in his/her honours subject in final examination. For this purpose a fund was created by the faculties of the department. The memorial lecture is delivered by an eminent scientist mostly an ex-student of the department.
- 2. Publication of quarterly wall magazine, **Neo-Physiologist**, which reflects the current trends in physiologyas well as the thinking of our students.
- 3. An educational excursion and project work for the final year honours students.
- 4. Regular parent-teacher meeting for evaluating the progress of the student.
- 5. Departmental seminar and class test.
- 6. Regular interaction with our ex-students, who have earned international reputation in the scientific arena. Recently, two of our ex-students, Br. Birendranath Mullick of J.N.U., New Delhi and Dr.Bhaskar Saha, National Centre for Cell Science, Pune got the S.S. Bhatnagar Award.
- 7. Ongoing research project is being conducted by the departmental teachers, funded by the U.G.C.

TEACHING AND EVALUATION

LEARNER-CENTRIC METHODS

Greater participation by the recipients of knowledge is a key factor in the process of education. Keeping this in mind, the College encourages learner-centric teaching methods. Thus, students' seminars, group-discussions and subject-related quizzes are conducted throughout the course. All these help the students to have a better grasp of the subjects.

EVALUATION

As per the new CBCS system, all students in all courses (Honours and General) will have to go through internal assessment which will carry considerable weight age in their final mark sheet. There will be 10% weight on internal assessment test(s) per paper, while 10% weight will be assigned to attendance performance. Apart from the above, the students will have to sit for tutorials, which will carry 15% weight for non-lab-based subjects. For lab-based subjects (Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Physiology and Zoology), there will be a 30 marks practical component per paper of 100 marks.

LABORATORIES

The College has spacious laboratories for the different science departments. Besides, the Departments of Commerce, Physics and Mathematics have separate Computer Labs.

REMEDIAL TEACHING

Additional classes are arranged on the determination of strength and weakness of students. Question-answer classes are arranged to prepare the students for university examination.

LIBRARY

The College has an excellent Central Library containing multiple copies of text and reference books in all relevant areas of the subjects taught. Reference books are available on a wide range of subjects and include encyclopedia, dictionaries, trade and other directories, Govt. publications, World Bank publications, etc. Collection of Newspapers and periodicals in the Library covers current affairs and a wide range of subjects. There are over 40,000 books and 15 Journals in the Library. The stock and services of the Library are aimed at catering to the needs of the students, teachers and researchers alike.

Library cards are issued at the beginning of the academic session. Fee books are to be produced at the time of Membership registration. Loss of the card must always be reported to the Librarian immediately. Fresh Card may be obtained on payment of a nominal fine.

The Library is a member of UGC N-LIST (National Library and Information Services for Scholarly Content) programme, through which the users can access full-text peer-reviewed electronic journals of various disciplines. Broad Band Internet facilities are available for searching e-resources. The Library provides OPAC (On-line Public Access Catalogue) service for searching books.

Honours students in different subjects are offered special facilities for study through the 'Seminar Libraries' attached to different departments under their respective Heads. Students will be required to surrender their cards at the end of each session and/ or submit clearance certificates from the Central Library or Seminar Library, as the case may be, to the office at the time of the issuance of Transfer certificates or when they are going to be sent up for University Examinations. It may be noted that even outgoing students are provided access to the Library through issue of a Special Card.

A separate section containing documents on different careers and employment opportunities has been established in the Library in association with the Career Guidance Cell of the College.

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CAMPUS SUPPORT SYSTEM

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL CELL

The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell comprising teaching staff for redressal of grievances from students. Anonymous letters of complaint shall not be entertained. The Complainants are required to drop their complaints into the Grievance Drop Box in the vicinity of Vice-Principal's room.

CONCESSION OF FEES

There is a system of fee-waiver for poor but meritorious students. Students desirous of availing of the opportunity must apply to the College authority after the publication of therelevant notice. Financial assistance is also extended to deserving students in respect of University examination fees.

RAILWAY CONCESSION

Students are entitled to travel by rail at a concessional fare subject to certain conditions. Necessary information in this regard may be obtained from the College office.

STUDENTS' CANTEEN

There is a subsidized students' canteen in the College premises.

MEDIC AL UNIT

A tie-up with students' Health Home provides medical benefits to students at a nominal charge. The college provides emergency medical support to students.

BOOK STALL

There is a book and stationery stall in the College premises, where most text books areavailable. It is a great help for the students who can find the recommended books at their doorstep.

CAREER AND COUNSELING CELL

The basic objectives of the Cell are threefold: (a) to sensitize the students about opportunities, both in their pursuit of higher studies and in their search for jobs, (b) to groom them for the job market, and (c) arranging for campus interview of final year students. A small beginning has already been made in respect of placement, as a few final year Commerce students/ fresh Science graduates have received job offers from reputed companies.
